What do we measure and why?

Patients treated at Emergency Departments (ED) sometimes require further care and are admitted to the hospital. If an inpatient hospital bed is not immediately available, the patient waits in the ED for one.

To ensure ED services are available when needed for seriously ill and injured people, those admitted patients who no longer require emergency care should be transferred to a nursing unit as soon as possible. In addition, prompt transfer to a nursing unit ensures that these patients receive appropriate and timely care. Island Health's strategic plan highlights improved access to services and patient flow as major objectives. Monitoring patient flow through the EDs aligns directly with these strategic goals.

This metric reflects how often admitted patients wait in the ED less than 10 hours from triage until they leave the ED for transfer to an inpatient bed, or to another facility.

What is the target?

The target is for 59% or more of patients to wait less than 10 hours in the ED before transfer to an inpatient unit or another facility.

Higher rates are better.

How are we doing?

As of November 2023, Island Health is not meeting the target.

What actions are we taking?

Improved access to services and improved patient flow are among Island Health's strategic priorities. Improving patient flow through the Emergency Departments aligns directly with these strategic goals.

Work continues to support patients in the community, prevent avoidable admissions to hospital, and identify appropriate alternatives to hospital care.

The "Hospital at Home" program in Victoria is working on increasing admissions from the EDs and will soon be admitting patients to the program before they access the EDs.
